Mary Margaret Doyen came to Kerrville as a young girl of 9 after an exotic childhood in the Philippines and Ceylon. However, she had come to the Hill Country during her earlier years to visit her grandparents, Mr. & Mrs. A. E. Self, who established Self's Jewelry in downtown Kerrville around the turn of the century. Her mother, Blanche Self Hall, grew up in Kerrville and worked in her father's Kodak photography refinishing studio in Self's Jewelry. As a result, Mary Margaret has a large collection of photos of Kerrville from this time period, the 20s and 30s. Mary Margaret talks about her grandfather's businesses in Kerrville, her father's venture into the tea business, her mother's photography refinishing and her meeting with her future husband, Glen, who was at Camp Mystic on R&R during World War II. They returned to Kerrville after the war where they raised their two children, the third generation to graduate from Tivy High School.
